Professionally, my identity is strongly linked to the field of distance education and online learning. This is the field that I have a strong passion for and I live and breathe it every day of my professional life. I am Regents' Professor of Distance Education and Instructional Technology in the Organization, Information, and Learning Sciences (OI&LS) program in the College of University Libraries and Learning Sciences at the University of New Mexico, Albuquerque, New Mexico, USA, where I have worked for over 24 years.

As a professional in distance education, I still battle with two major concerns. One is the need to provide access to education to the disadvantaged, the less accessible. With high tech gadgetry and expense we make the gap between the "haves" and "have nots" wider. My second concern is the need to develop sound instructional design principles for distance education, specifically online learning in order to support the distance learner to learn in new and different ways.

Another area of professional interest is intercultural communication. Increasingly, I have blended my interest in distance education with my interest in intercultural communication as the distance education field is becoming global and international. I just completed writing and editing a book with Insung Jung on *Culture and Online learning* that will be published by Stylus this year.
