Types of summaries

- School summary/ stand alone summary/ summary essay
 - To assess your ability to synthesize, paraphrase ideas
- Inside text summary
 - Part of a larger text (literature review, review, annotated bibliography, book chapter, etc)
- FOCUS ON SCHOOL SUMMARY
 - STUDY PURPOSES
 - TO INTEGRATE READING AND WRITING
 - TO HELP THE UNDERSTANDING OF THE TEXT

PARTS

A) FIRST SENTENCE

REFERENCE + REPORTING VERB + MAIN IDEA OF THE TEXT

- B) SUPPORT THE FIRST SENTENCE WITH MAIN IDEAS AVOIDING DETAILS
- C) CONCLUSION (WRAP UP, CLOSURE OF THE TEXT)

REPORTING VERBS

REMINDER PHRASES

NEUTRAL WORDS (DO NOT SHOW YOUR OPINION)

BE CONCISE

PARAPHRASE (NO QUOTES)
