- b) Explain how some investors might choose A and others might choose B if preferences are based on mean and variance.
- c) Compare A and B, using the second-order stochastic dominance criterion.
- 4.15 Answer the following questions either true or false:
  - a) T \_\_\_\_ F \_\_\_ If asset A is stochastically dominant over asset B according to the second-order criterion, it is also dominant according to the first-order criterion.
  - b) T \_\_\_\_ F \_\_\_ If asset A has a higher mean and higher variance than asset B, it is stochastically dominant, according to the first-order criterion.
  - c) T \_\_\_\_ F \_\_\_ A risk-neutral investor will use second-order stochastic dominance as a decision criterion only if the returns of the underlying assets are normally distributed.
  - d) T \_\_\_\_\_ F \_\_\_\_ A second-order stochastic dominance criterion is consistent with utility functions that have positive marginal utility and risk aversion.
